After considerable talk it was proposed that a match be made between the two, the loser of the race to purchase a \$100 diamond for the winner. This was accepted on behalf of the Lincolns, and their representative will be at Winter's cafe at noon today with \$100, and it is hoped the Thistle club's representative will be on hand. As Searle is in excellent condition a hot race is expected Tuesday next, the date fixed on as most convenient.

It is expected the Chicago-Milwaukee race between Wolfe and "Letter-Carrier" Smith will not come off Sunday next in consequence of this match.

BLOOM IS BEATEN BY JOE BERTRAND.

Former Lies Down in the Third Round and Disgusts the Lookers-On.

Joe Bertrand and Walter Bloom, featherweights, met in a basement on the South Side last night to contest ten rounds for 75 and 25 per cent of the gate receipts. The contest, however, did not last three rounds, as Bloom had had enough before the expiration of that round. About 100 spectators witnessed the mill, which was full of ginger while it lasted. Bloom, who was the lighter of the two, slashed in with right and left in the opening round and had a shade the best of it. In the second, however, he died away before the vicious onslaught of Bertrand, and although Bloom capsized Joe several times it was plain he was tiring of his job. Bertrand, who was hog fat, sailed in to do or die in the third round and continually rushed his opponent. Bloom accepted a light blow on the side of his head and dropped on the tanbark flooring, remaining there long enough to be counted out. It was a clear case of quit, and the crowd left the basement disgusted with the showing he made.

Hastings, England, Aug. 21.—The thirteenth round of the International Chess Masters' Tournament today resulted as follows:

 - Pollock beat Tarrasch in a French defense after twenty-five moves.
 - Janowski beat Marco in a Ruy Lopez after fifty-five moves.
 - Mason beat Vergani in a Ruy Lopez after fifty-six moves.
 - Albin beat Schiffers in a Sicilian defense after forty-eight moves.
 - Steinitz beat Teichgorin in an Evans gambit after forty-five moves.
- The games Blackburn vs. Pillsbury (king's bishop's gambit), Burn vs. Bird (pawn to queen's-four opening), Schlechter vs. Mises (Ruy Lopez) were drawn after seventy-six, forty-one, and sixty moves respectively. The game between Teichmann and Gunsberg was adjourned.
