

CHICAGO BOXERS WOULD AID KIN OF RIVER DEAD

Coulon Suggests Benefit Show for Relatives of Victims; Up to Mayor.

Boxers of Chicago and the middle west will battle for charity in a huge benefit performance for the relatives of the victims who lost their lives in the Eastland disaster, if Mayor Thompson gives his official O. K. to the plans which were formulated in brief last night.

Johnny Coulon, former bantamweight champion, telephoned to THE TRIBUNE suggesting that such a benefit be held. He said he was ready to do his little part. Already he has secured promises from several local boxers that they would lend their services without remuneration.

As the situation now stands, nothing can be done until Mayor Thompson returns. It is expected that he will arrive Wednesday morning, as he left the coast yesterday afternoon. Whether Thompson will waive the steadfast rule against boxing, upheld since 1806, when former Mayor Harrison crushed the game of fistcuffs in Chicago, will not be known until a committee representing the boxers confronts him with the proposition.

Mickey Sheridan in Line.

Mickey Sheridan, one of Chicago's leading welterweights, also called up THE TRIBUNE, making the same suggestion proposed by Coulon. Mickey reported that he had recovered from his recent automobile accident and would be pleased to appear in one of the sketches.

Then Harry James, manager of Heavyweight Jack Moran and other fighters, made announcement that he already had obtained the promises of Johnny Coulon, Fred Gilmore, Charley White, and Johnny Ritchie to help the cause. He also wired Mike Gibbons, the St. Paul phantom, and felt certain that the wizard would be one of the contestants, if permitted to exhibit his skill.

James Will Furnish Expenses.

Furthermore, James agreed to furnish the money for the preliminary expenses and turn over the net receipts. Original plans include a program of five or six bouts of six rounds each, with two minute sessions. If official sanction is secured the Coliseum probably will be the scene some time within a week or ten days.

"We are hopeful of getting a permit for such a benefit event," said James. "I do not see why there should be any objections, as the entire receipts will go to the general fund for the benefit of the relatives. The contests will be purely exhibitions, and there will not be a semblance of a prize fight at any time."

Another meeting of those interested in the proposition will be held at the Hotel Morrison at 4:30 o'clock this afternoon.

Former Boxer Victim of Eastland Disaster.



JOSEPH BERTRAND

THE body of Joe Bertrand, formerly Pacific coast bantamweight champion and well known in Chicago in the '90s, was removed from the hull of the Eastland yesterday afternoon, ending a two days' search by his family, who did not know he had embarked on the ill fated ship. Bertrand was known as the "Little Demon" in the heyday of his pugilistic career, fighting more than 100 battles. He was born in Montreal, Canada, in 1865.

Bertrand lived at 2910 Broadway. He left home Friday night to work for a concessionaire on the Eastland. The body was found at 3 o'clock and identified by a name in the suit. Mrs. Bertrand, who had asked the police for information, was notified.

A draw with Jimmy Barry in a fight at Tattersall's, which was stopped by the police after six rounds, was one of Bertrand's most famous performances. He whipped Jack Murphy in twenty-three rounds at San Francisco, beat Joe Sullivan at the California A. C., San Francisco, and defeated Harry Dally, then Australian champion, in ten rounds at the Olympic club, Cincinnati, O. In 1897 he was a member of John L. Sullivan's all star aggregation of boxers and wrestlers which toured the United States under the direction of Parson Davies, meeting all comers.

INVADER TAKES WAUKEGAN RACE

SKOKIE GOLF TOURNAMENT ATTRACTS FIELD OF 140

A field of 140 golfers has registered for the invitation tournament to be given by the Skokie Country club Thursday, Friday, and Saturday. Play will begin Thursday morning at 8 o'clock and continue each morning and afternoon. Thirty-six holes will be contested in the qualifying round the first day of the meet, the field covering the course in and out in the morning and afternoon. Winner of low qualifying score will receive a gold medal. Play in the tourney is limited to players over 30 years.

The player over 55 years with the lowest qualifying score will receive a prize for Thursday's play. Other awards will go to the member and guest having the best choice, eighteen holes; to the foursome having the most threes, or lower scores, in their combined total for thirty-six holes; to the players with low thirty for the day on holes 2, 7, 9, and 13, and on holes 3, 5, 11, and 18, with the stipulation that no player shall be awarded more than two prizes.

The players Thursday will be divided in flights of sixteen, qualifying for the Skokie, Elm, Willow, Hickory, and Oak cups. The first round of eighteen holes for the ups in the five flights will be played Friday morning. A field will compete in thirty-six holes, medal play. Prizes will be given to the player with the most fours or lower in the thirty-six holes and the player with the best choice eighteen holes. The prizes will be open only to players who did not qualify Thursday.

Friday morning's play will be the second eighteen for the five cups and first eighteen for the Shelter, Waterloo, Sunset, Bluff, and Grange cups, open to losers in the morning's match play. Seminals in all cup events, match play for fifteen holes, will be held Saturday morning, and finals over eighteen holes in the afternoon. The course will be open to golfers in the tournament on Wednesday.
